FOREWARD

This publication consolidates information essential to a member's knowledge of 39th Flight-Eagle, Order of Daedalians, Robins AFB, Georgia. This information supplements "The Daedalian Handbook" dated 1 April 1990 and all Memoranda as of 4 December 1997. The Flight's origin, biography of our Founder member, and list of past Flight Captains were obtained from records thanks to Ken Clark, our current Historian.

HISTORY

THE FLEDGLING 39th FLIGHT-EAGLE

It started over coffee. Ken Clark and Ken Klein were shooting the breeze in January 1975 and talk turned to their past enjoyment of Daedalian meetings and fellowship at other bases. They had been screening the National Membership Directory and knew other members were in the area so they agreed to contact as many as possible to gather for a social. The response was enthusiastic. On 8 March 1975, 24 Daedalians, including the WR-ALC/CC, Maj. Gen. Holland, the WR-ALC/CV, Brig. Gen. Schneider, the AFRES/CV, Maj. Gen. Anderson, and Founder Member Guy Stone, were joined by 16 guests and wives for a memorable evening--mess dress and medals, long dress, the whole bit! Guy Stone celebrated his 78th birthday. He and Roland Neel, a WW I observer and prominent Macon business leader who helped establish Robins AFB, regaled the gathering with stories of their flying experiences. Everyone agreed the occasion should be repeated under the aegis of an established local flight.

The first business meeting of the planning group was on 11 June 1975 and provisional officers were elected: Flight Captain - Ray Smittle, Vice Flight Captain - Ken Clark, Adjutant - Erv Manning, Treasure - Roger Rothwell, and Provost Marshall - Jerry Kippenberger. Flight names of Peach, Gator and Eagle were contemplated and Eagle was selected for three reasons. As the National symbol, the eagle represents patriotism; the eagle, strong, courageous and aggressive, symbolizes military aviation's spirit; and the F-15 Eagle is depot-supported at Robins AFB. The petition for charter was signed, forwarded in July, and approved by National on 4 August 1975.

Charter night was held on 20 September 1975 with about 100 attendees in full regalia. Guest of honor was Lt.Gen. Jim Sherrill (Ret), National Commander-Elect, who presented the charter, installed the officers, petitioners, and inducted 16 more charter members.

OATH OF A DAEDALIAN

I, (NAME), in the presence of almighty God and these witnesses, do promise that I will forever abide by the tenets of the Order of Daedalians, first, to place nation above self; second, to be worthy of the trust and confidence of fellow Daedalians. I make these promises with no equivocation or mental reservation, and ask the aid of almighty God to assist me in unwavering adherence to the spirit and provisions of this promise. So help me God and keep me steadfast.

FOUNDER MEMBER

1ST. LT GUY O. STONE (Ret)

While searching for Daedalians to form a local flight, Ken Klein found Guy Stone of Glenwood, GA, the only Founder Member from Georgia, listed in the National Membership roster.

After taking his first training as a cadet at Georgia Tech, Lt. Stone was sent to France as a Lieutenant in the Signal Corps, which had only 54 pilots at the beginning of WW I. He completed final pilot training at a time when flight instruction was causing almost as many casualties as combat flying, he recalled. Following graduation, he became an instructor on cross-country flying in 1917, using a Nieuport trainer. The following year he was sent to the Italian front with an American group commanded by Maj. Fiorello LaGuardia, who later became mayor of New York city. Stone was named Chancellor of the Order of Merit of the Italian republic, the only man outside the nobility to win this title, for his service in Italy. Lt. Stone's flying career spanned less than three years.

After WW II [is this supposed to be WW I?], he returned to Glenwood, bought his father's store, and soon married. He was elected mayor, the start of a political career that led to the state Senate in 1945. The Stones' only son, Guy, Jr., a Marine aviator, was killed in a WW II training flight.

Guy never lost his interest in aviation. He made a point of meeting and following the careers of famous aviators, maintaining scrapbooks of news clippings and other memorabilia. He and his wife, Katherine, were a charming and talented couple who warmly befriended all of Eagle Flight's fledgling members. she would regularly drive them the hour and a half trip to attend Daedalian functions. Guy would administer the Oath of a Daedalian inducting new members, tying the newest members to the origins of the Order in a unique and significant way. He shared his 30 volumes of pictorial aviation history (scrapbooks) with attendees, and delighted everyone with his personal reminiscences of legendary aviators such as Charles Lindbergh, Eddie Rickenbacker, Billy Mitchell, and LaGuardia. Sometimes small groups of Daedalians traveled to visit the Stones' Glenwood home to view Guy's impressive library of aviation mementos.

Guy's health deteriorated quickly after Katherine's sudden death in March 1979, and Guy passed away on 3 November 1980. He was buried with full military honors in Cobbtown, GA. Guy Stone was immortalized as an aviation pioneer by being inducted into Georgia's Aviation Hall of Fame in August 1989, and some of his aviation memorabilia can be seen at the Robins AFB Museum of Aviation.

THE GUY STONE AWARD

The award is presented to a deserving 39th Flight member who demonstrated service and direction epitomized by Guy Stone's performance to foster aviation and our Flight.

AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The 39th Flight annually honors distinguished individuals who have demonstrated superior achievements in leadership, scholastics, and a desire for a military aviation career. Awards and scholarships are given as incentives toward study in aeronautics and/or for ground and flight training leading to a private pilot's license for cadets in Air Force and Navy Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) and Civil Air Patrol (CAP). Scholarships can be matched by the Daedalian Foundation up to \$1000.

JESSE E. TANNER, JR. MEMORIAL AWARD

Jesse Tanner, son of Chief Master Sgt. Jesse Tanner (Ret) and active in the local CAP, died in 1978 in the line of duty as a deputy sheriff. The Flight began this award in 1979 and originally designated it as a \$100 scholarship. The Daedalian Foundation established the Daedalian CAP Flight Scholarship Award in 1977.

THE GUNTHER - HIEBERT MEMORIAL AWARD

This award is presented in honor and memory of fellow 39th Flight members Col. Caroll D. Gunther and Capt. Donald W. Hiebert, lost in an 11 April 1982 B-52 crash during Red Flag exercises near Nellis AFB, NV. This award assumed the Flight's scholarship award in 1982.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be Eagle Flight; it is designated the 39th Flight of the Order of Daedalians, a national non-profit organization.

ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this Flight shall be to further the objectives of the Order of Daedalians as set forth in official publications of the National Order and to foster good fellowship among military aviators through membership and participation in Flight activities.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS

Section 1 - Membership should consist of the following classes:

ACTIVE MEMBERS
LIFE MEMBERS

Section 2 - Active Membership

ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP shall include Active Members of the Order of Daedalians who elect to pay Flight dues to Eagle Flight on an annual basis.

Section 3 - Life Membership

LIFE MEMBERSHIP in Eagle Flight may be granted to any active Life Member of the National Order upon payment of Flight Life Member dues as established by the Flight.

ARTICLE IV - DUES

Section 1 - Flight Dues

Flight dues are the primary means for providing funds to administer the Flight, pay general operating expenses such as printing and postage, and financially support approved Flight projects. Annual dues, as established by the Flight, shall be payable on or before 1 January each year for the ensuing year. New members joining after 31 January will be assessed pro rata dues by months remaining in the year. Delinquent members shall be required to pay the full annual assessment regardless of the month of payment if they wish to be reinstated.

Section 2 - Dues Determination

Dues shall be determined by a majority vote of a quorum of members at a regular business meeting of the Flight. Increases or decreases may be recommended by the Finance Committee or the elected officers of the Flight after review of anticipated income and expenses for the following year, and voted on at a regular business meeting of the Flight.

Section 3 - Notices and Delinquent Notices

The Treasurer shall ensure that mailings to the General Membership during the months of October, November, and December include reminders that dues are payable. In March, individual delinquent notices shall be sent as necessary by the Treasurer. On 1 April, delinquent members shall be dropped from the roll.

Section 4 - Excusable and Reinstatement

A Flight member who departs the area or cannot otherwise reasonably expect to participate in Flight activities for one or more years may request relief of Flight dues and be reinstated without prejudice on a pro rata basis as a new member. Once a Flight member has become delinquent in payment of dues, he shall be required to pay the full annual assessment, regardless of the month of payment, if he desires reinstatement.

Section 5 - Transfers

Daedalians who are members in good standing of another Flight and who wish to be affiliated with Eagle Flight may do so at any time prior to 31 December of each year without paying current dues. They will be assessed the subsequent year's dues along with other Eagle Flight members on or before 1 January.

Section 6 - Life Membership

Life Membership in Eagle Flight for Life Members of the National Order may be granted upon payment within one calendar year of dues based on the age of the applicant as established by the elected offices of the Flight and approved by the majority of a quorum of the members at a regular business meeting.

ARTICLE V - FISCAL YEAR

The Fiscal Year of the Eagle Flight shall be 1 January through 31 December

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

Section 1 - Officers

The officers of the Flight shall include the elected officers, members of the Executive council, and Chairs of the Standing Committees. chair of the Task Groups and Special Committees shall function as officers pro-tem.

Section 2 - Elected Officers

The elected officers of the Flight shall be a Flight Captain, a Vice Flight Captain, Adjutant, Assistant Adjutant, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Provost Marshall, and Assistant Provost Marshall. They shall be elected by a ballot of the entire membership to serve for one year or until their successors are elected. Elections will be held prior to 1 January each year and the new officers will be installed in the January meeting. The offices of Assistant Treasurer, Assistant Adjutant, and assistant Provost Marshall shall be filled by those nominees receiving the second highest number of votes from a slate of no less than two members nominated for each position by the nominating committee and the general membership (see Article VII).

Section 3 - Executive Council

The Executive Council shall consist of the current Flight Captain, Vice Flight Captain, Adjutant, Treasurer, and Provost Marshall, plus the immediate past Flight Captain and Flight Adjutant. The Flight Captain shall be Chair of the Executive Council.

Section 4 - Standing Committees

Standing committees whose Chairs are appointed by the Flight Captain, with the approval of the Executive Council shall be:

- Accounting and Finance
- Membership
- Programs and Public Affairs
- Public Relations and Publicity
- Awards and Recognition

Section 5 - Task Groups and Special Committees

The Flight Captain may appoint Task Groups and/or Special Committees to accomplish one-time projects as deemed desirable by the Executive Council. These Committees shall include, but are not limited to: the Nominating Committee, which shall include the immediate past Flight Captain and Vice Flight Captain if they are currently active Flight members and are available to serve.

ARTICLE VII - ELECTIONS

Section 1 - Term in Office

New officers shall assume their duties upon installation to office at the Annual Meeting in January of each year (Article XI, Section 4) and shall serve until the following year's installation.

Section 2 - Nominations

The Flight Captain shall appoint a Nominating Committee not later than 15 September of each year. Past Flight Captains currently in good standing as Flight members who are available to serve will be invited to serve along with other

selected members for a total committee of not less than three. The Committee will consider the qualification of possible nominees, ascertain their willingness to serve, and recommend to the membership at the October meeting not fewer than one nominee each for the offices of Flight Captain and Vice Flight Captain, and not fewer than two nominees each for the offices of Adjutant, Treasurer, and Provost Marshall. Additional nominations from the floor will be entertained. The resulting proposed and seconded nominations will be communicated to the entire active membership of the Flight in writing prior to 30 November, along with notification of General Election in December.

Section 3 - Election

Election shall be by written ballot of the active membership in response to written notice of General Election. Ballots must be returned prior to or at the beginning of the December meeting. They will be validated and counted by an Election Committee appointed by the presiding officer at the December meeting. Simple majority of returned ballots shall decide election to offices. Nominees polling the second highest number of votes to the offices of Adjutant, Treasurer, and Provost Marshall become elected Assistants to those offices. Tie votes shall be decided by vote of members present at the meeting.

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Section 1 - General

The Executive Council shall conduct the routine, daily business of the Flight subject to ratification of the general membership as reflected in minutes of meetings. The Council is the servant of the membership and must be responsive to requests/expressions of the majority. Routinely, the Executive Council will pass on substantiated recommendations for:

Awards and Recognition

Programs and projects suitable to the objective of the Flight/Order

Annual dues assessment for Active Flight Members (subject to approval by a quorum of the members)

Such other duties as herein designated.

ARTICLE IX - SUCCESSION

The order of succession of leadership of the Flight shall be the Flight Captain, Vice Flight Captain, Adjutant, Provost Marshall, Treasurer, Assistant Adjutant, Assistant Provost Marshall, and Assistant Treasurer. Should the Flight Captain become unable to serve that post during his term in office, the Vice Flight Captain shall assume his duties and responsibilities until the next scheduled election. Likewise, should any other officer become ineligible or incapable of fulfilling his term in office, the assistant shall assume the responsibilities. A new election shall not be required unless the remaining assembly of principals and assistants is insufficient to fill the primary offices of the Flight (Captain, Vice Captain, Adjutant, Treasurer, and Provost Marshall) or a three-fourths majority of the membership requests an interim election for any office vacated.

ARTICLE X - DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

Section 1 - General

The duties of officers shall be those prescribed in Article VI, CONSTITUTION, Order of Daedalians. In each case, the assistant shall assume the duties of the principal in his absence or inability to serve.

Section 2 - Standing Committees

The ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be responsible for ensuring proper and accurate administration of the Flight monetary assets and liabilities through preparation of the Annual Flight Budget and through audit, at least once annually, of the Flight Financial Records. Upon change of Flight Treasurers as a result of election or other change of office, the committee will reconcile the records of the outgoing Treasurer and submit for Executive Council review a budget for the succeeding year's expenditures to further the objectives of the Order/Flight, investments, and subsequent annual dues assessments in relations to costs of administration and approved programs.

The MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE shall be responsible for the expeditious screening of all applicants for membership to the Order of Daedalians and/or Flight affiliation, assuring that applicants hold all qualifications for the category of membership requested prior to forwarding such applications to the National Headquarters for approval. The Chair of the Membership Committee shall, with the help of committee members:

Maintain and publish an up-to-date social roster of Flight members, listing addresses, telephone numbers, and preferred first names of members and spouses.

Actively promote Flight membership of Daedalians residing within reasonable distance of Robins AFB, GA.

Inform the Flight Provost Marshall of the need to induct new members to the Order and Flight, and help to ensure that timely and appropriate ceremonies are scheduled.

Serve ex-officio as the membership Representative of the National Order for the State of Georgia, relaying change of address and other desired information on becoming aware of same.

Monitor the status of Flight members and advise the Flight Adjutant of occurrences deserving recognition on behalf of the Flight. Examples include imminent departure from the area of a member, promotion or other

significant recognition, serious illness or death of a member or within a member's immediate family.

The PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be responsible for arranging the principal social activities of the Flight in furtherance of the Flight objectives. The Chair of this committee will periodically survey the membership in attendance at a scheduled meeting to determine the types of programs that are acceptable and will be supported. The consensus of the group will be reported in the minutes of the meeting and will provide the basis for program planning. The committee will then accomplish the necessary details such as reserving facilities, inviting speakers and other guests, arranging the menu and suitable entertainment, and ensuring timely notification of members. The Chair and members of this committee will also be alert for occasions such as patriotic or civic events, visits by prominent dignitaries, and other observances, in which participation by the Flight would be welcome by responsible officials and would be in keeping with the traditions and objectives of the Order.

The PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PUBLICITY COMMITTEE shall be responsible for ensuring that the Flight and activities thereof receive recognition, within propriety, through publication of written accounts and photographs in the Daedalian Flyer and other media. The committee will compose and provide to the Flight Adjutant brief accounts of Flight activities for inclusion in periodic letters to members. This committee will also maintain the official history of the Flight, to include a scrapbook recording all major Flight accomplishments and activities. In addition, this committee will be responsible for further development of the Daedalian Room in the Robins Air Force Base Officers Open Mess, to include appropriate and secure display of aviation memorabilia for the enjoyment and appreciation of all Open Mess members and guests.

The AWARDS AND RECOGNITION COMMITTEE shall be responsible for recommending to the membership programs of recognition by the Flight of individuals and/or units in keeping with the objectives of the Order. When approved by the membership, the committee shall accomplish necessary arrangements and details, to include acquisition of suitable plaques, trophies, certificates, monetary awards, etc., and arrangements for presentation. Recommendations for specific awards resulting from approved general programs will be subject to approval of the Executive Council (Article VII, Section 1). Coordination with the Public Relations and Publicity Committee will be accomplished to ensure proper documentation and publicity.

ARTICLE XI - MEETINGS

Section 1 - Regular Meetings

Regular meetings of the Flight shall normally be held at least ten (10) times a year, normally at monthly intervals and publicized at least one week in advance by

newsletter or other appropriate means. Business may be conducted at any publicized regular meeting attended by a quorum of members. (Sec. 4).

Section 2 - Induction of Members

Eligible individuals desiring induction into the Order may be inducted at any regular meeting. If the inductee so desires, induction can be postponed to an evening function with spouses and guests. The Membership Chair is responsible for ascertaining that the desires of the inductee are accomplished. (Article X - Section 2).

Section 3 - Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting shall be an evening meeting in January.

Section 4 - Quorum

One-fourth of the member of the Flight in good standing at a given time shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XII - ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

Section 1 - Maintenance of Official Flight Files

Flight files shall be maintained by the Adjutant in accordance with procedures recommended by the National Order in its Flight Captain's Handbook and shall include but not limited to:

- National Constitution and Bylaws
- Flight Bylaws
- Minutes of Flight Meetings
- Flight Activity Reports
- Flight Financial Reports and Statements
- National Membership Directory
- Zip Code Regional Membership Roster (current within one year)
- Current Flight Membership Roster
- Flight Social Roster (current within one year)
- National Headquarters Policy Directives and Correspondence
- Flight Notices, Bulletins, and Letters to General Membership
- Minutes, Flight Executive Council Meetings

Section 2 - Correspondence

The Flight Captain, Vice Flight Captain and Flight Adjutant shall be made information addresses on all official correspondence initiated by Flight officers. No correspondence other than initiated by Flight officers shall be deemed official (Article VI, Section 5).

Section 3 - Operating Expense

Normal operating expense shall include but not be limited to: purchases of official

Flight stationery and incidental office supplies, postage, printing or reproduction of bulletins and special notices to the membership, telephone expenses incurred by Flight officers in the conduct of official Flight business, provision of name tags for guests and place cards for official functions. Reimbursement for such expenses incurred by any Flight officer shall be made by the Flight Treasurer on submission of a request by the officer concerned, subject to the limitations below.

Section 4 - Expenditure of Funds

Flight officers may obligate and be reimbursed from monetary assets for operating expenses up to \$25 per calendar year without prior approval. Expenditures greater than \$25 but not exceeding \$50 per year may be authorized by the coordinated agreement of the Flight Adjutant, Treasurer, and Chair of the Accounting and Finance Committee. Any single expenditure exceeding \$50 not in the approved Flight Budget must have prior approval of the Executive Council as a Budget Amendment. the Flight Adjutant shall have authority to sign checks against the Flight Checking Account as an alternate to and during the temporary absence of the Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer.

Section 5 - Annual Flight Budget

The Annual Flight Budget shall be prepared by the Accounting and Finance Committee (Article X, Section 20). The Budget shall be sufficiently detailed to forecast reasonable expenditures exceeding \$25 per year necessary to carry on the business of the Flight, by calendar quarter, for the ensuing year. Budget categories shall include, but not be limited to, such foreseeable expenses as postage, printing and reproduction, awards and recognition, incidental expenses of Flight officers (not exceeding \$25 each), condolences and special recognition (Article X, Section 2, MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE), entertainment and deferment of expenses of invited speakers (Article X, Section 2, PROGRAM COMMITTEE), and development of the Daedalian Room (Article X, Section 2, PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PUBLICITY COMMITTEE).

ARTICLE XIII - PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

Roberts Rules of Order, newly revised, shall govern the proceedings of the Flight in all cases not provided for in these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XIV - AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at regular meetings of the Flight, providing that a quorum exists and the proposed amendment has been publicized in writing to the general membership at least thirty days in advance.

PROVISO

These Bylaws shall take effect immediately upon approval by a majority vote of the Flight membership. Members will be furnished copies of the Bylaws in advance and be asked to approve or submit suggested changes in writing prior to 28 February 1998.

We, the undersigned members of the 39th Flight Eagle, Order of Daedalians, recommend these Bylaws this 1st day of December 1997.
